Immigrants Drive the **EL PASO ECONOMY**

E l Paso is home to over 200,000 immigrants (25.9 percent of the metro population). The immigrant population in El Paso represents 5 percent of the entire immigrant population in the state of Texas.¹

Immigrants have played a leading role in El Paso's economic success and make up 29.4 percent of the total metro labor force. El Paso immigrants work in a wide range of jobs, most heavily concentrated in education, health care and social services.²

Immigrants also power the El Paso economy as job creators, small business owners and entrepreneurs, and are self-employed at a higher rate (10.2 percent) than the Native-born population (4.1 percent).³




